SAMPLE LESSONS

PREK - GRADE 2

ELA - Story Retelling

Lesson: Students listen to or read The Very Hungry Caterpillar or a similar narrative. Task: Retell the story in order using pictures, sequencing cards, or oral storytelling.

Science - Exploring Animal Habitats

Lesson: Students learn about different environments like the forest, ocean, and desert. Task: Match animals to their habitats using a worksheet or chart.

Math - Comparing Lengths

Lesson: Students explore measuring using nonstandard units (e.g., hands, blocks). Task: Measure classroom objects and record their lengths.

GRADES 3-5

Social Studies - Virginia Geography

Lesson: Students study Virginia's regions, including the Coastal Plain/Tidewater, Piedmont, Blue Ridge Mountains, and Appalachian Plateau.

Task: Label a map and describe features of each region.

Math - Fractions on a Number Line

Lesson: Students practice placing fractions on a number line. Task: Use printed number lines to place and label fractions like 1/2, 3/4, and 5/8.

ELA - Character Traits

Lesson: Students read a short story and analyze a main character.

Task: Identify traits and provide textual evidence in writing or a graphic organizer.

GRADES 6 - 8

Science - Phases of the Moon

Lesson: Students learn about the eight moon phases and how they occur.

Task: Label diagrams and describe each phase in writing.

Math - Area and Perimeter

Lesson: Students calculate area and perimeter of rectangles and compound shapes. Task: Solve word problems related to designing rooms, gardens, or other real-life spaces.

ELA – Persuasive Writing

Lesson: Students write a persuasive essay based on a topic of their choice.

Task: Develop a clear argument with supporting reasons and evidence in a structured format.

Social Studies – Interpreting Primary Sources

Lesson: Students examine a historical photograph or document (e.g., a newspaper clipping or diary excerpt).

Task: Answer questions to interpret the source and connect it to a historical event.
